CUES TO STAND FOR COMMON PRAYER

End of Offertory: **'Pray, brothers and sisters'**, stand till end of *Holy, holy* After Holy Communion: **'Let us pray'**, stand till end of Mass

HOW DO WE PRAY THE 'A THIARNA, DÉAN TRÓCAIRE?'

Our six parishes have begun singing 'A Thiarna, déan trócaire' with our wonderful choirs leading us. Naturally enough some congregations are louder than others in the singing, and some forget to respond, but over the next few weeks and months we'll build up our singing practice.

Now that we are also standing for the 'Lord, have mercy', how should be pray it internally? ...in our hearts and minds, with our eyes?

It's good to start by asking what the 'Kyrie, eleison' or 'Lord, have mercy' is all about. It's not actually part of the Penitential Act, not usually anyway. It comes after that part of Mass, and may seem to be similar in theme, but it's quite distinct.

The Penitential Act has us express our sorrow for having sinned. The 'Lord, have mercy' focuses on the Lord himself, and is a short, sung litany asking for mercy. The original words come to us from the ancient custom of emperors visiting a city far from the centre of their empire. The visit was perhaps once in the emperor's lifetime. People greeted him, sometimes with joy, sometimes with trembling, but requesting he be kind and merciful. They weren't thinking necessarily that they had offended him, but he certainly would have some influence on their lives during the visit. This imperial 'visit' or 'coming' – in Latin 'Adventus' and Greek 'Parousia' – was taken up by the Church when thinking about the Lord's return in glory to judge the living and the dead.

Singing at the beginning of Mass as if the Lord were about to return is quite an ancient practice, recalling that we celebrate Mass in anticipation of his return: When we eat this bread....we proclaim your death until you come again'. Starting Mass while recalling that every celebration is oriented towards his return is important. But how do we pray it? First of all, have that in mind, that we are thinking of the Lord's coming as we celebrate Mass as he requested until he returns. Secondly, the *Kyrie* was traditionally sung during the veneration of the altar and its cross. Why not look on the crucifix as a help in praying to the Lord himself whose return we await?

One version of the penitential act includes the *Kyrie*. But notice it is not focussed at all on our having sinned, but rather on the Lord's characteristics and mission: You were sent to heal the contrite of heart; you are seated at the right hand of the Father to intercede for us; you are mighty God and prince of peace. It's really a development of the *Kyrie*, and entirely in keeping with the meaning of the chant.

So when you join in singing the *A Thiarna, déan trócaire* on Sundays in one of our six parishes, do recall it is addressed to the Lord Jesus, looking forward to his return in glory, and maybe looking to the crucifix while you join in singing it - a practise now quite common in France - can help keep our minds focussed on the prayer.
